T he Great Plains Region will once again celebrate the pride and passion for Porsche as we return to the rustic brick streets of historic Havelock in Lincoln, Sunday, September 13, for the "On the Avenue" Car Show. This marks our twelfth consecutive appearance in the finest open car show in the state, courtesy of our friends at the Capitol City Ford and Mustang Club. Now in its 28th year, the 2008 show drew over 250 cars.

This year, we are honoring the 356 with an extraordinary event. We are attempting to gather a dozen 356s and line an entire city block with them. Photos will be taken of this special occasion, along with an article submitted to both the 356 Registry and Panorama. For the first time at the show, there will be a 356-only class. There will also be 356 collectibles for all 356 participants, as well as a drawing for a 1/18th scale model last made in 1989.

The three other classes are: 1966-1979, 1980-1994, and 1995-current. Awards will be given to the top three in each class. There will be 23 door prizes, as well as collectibles for the first twelve Porsches entered. With the early \$20 registration, you also receive a free T-shirt.

or some time, Sandy Steckman Fand other local GPR members have been discussing the idea of driving on several race tracks in the same day. The goal was to start at Iowa Speedway, drive some laps, then do the same thing at MAM near Glenwood, continue on to MPH in Hastings, and end up at Heartland Park in Topeka. Sandy mentioned his idea to me about six months ago and asked if I would be willing to organize the event. I said yes without knowing the logistics and time involved in such an endeavor. After several months of planning, thousands of e-mails, conversations and phone messages, we finally set a date - June 2009! Unfortunately, Speedway kept throwing up "road blocks", so we decided to start at MAM. As far as we know, no other club has driven on three race tracks in three states in the same day. We started with about 10-12 drivers saying they would participate, but we ended up with seven cars and a few





We began at MAM at about 8:30 a.m. on Wednesday, June 24. We had seven Porsches, driven by Sandy Steckman, Rick Schaffer, Leah Schaffer (Rick's daughter), JR Sanders, Jim Lang, Larry Dean, and myself. Jim Howe, the manager of MAM, opened the track just for us. We had two staff

photojournalists from the Omaha World Herald there record the event and interview drivers. An article was published July 7 in the World Herald and video was posted on their web site. The MAM track photographer took pictures and posted them on their web site. I should mention that MAM and MPH did not charge us anything to use the track - they extremely accommodating! The photojournalists (one male, one female) were having so much fun that they asked if

they could ride to Hastings with us. One of them rode with me and the other with Sandy. They took video from our cars during the trip and interviewed both of us. Heather Wester took us on the "scenic route" from MAM to get to the Interstate - we caravanned all the way, keeping in touch by 2-way radios. Unfortunately, Leah had to leave us at Lincoln, so we had six cars for the rest of the journey. Heather rode with JR, Lori Carnahan rode with Rick, and George Poullos rode with me (after we got to Hastings).

At MPH in Hastings, George Anderson met us with his usual enthusiasm. We arrived around noon and were there for nearly two hours. There were several reporters from the Hastings and Grand newspapers as well as the News Director from the local NBC affiliate (my cousin, Dennis Kellogg). Nice articles were subsequently published in the local papers and several TV broadcasts were aired with some nice footage on the track. One of the TV photojournalists rode with me for a few laps - they could not use much of the footage because I think he suffered from vertigo trying to look



through the camera while also checking to see if we were going to crash!

We made a side trip at Hastings to the Tessman's "vintage" garage near the Hastings airport. They are the parents of Brian Tessman, one of our local members. Those of you who went to our event in Hastings this spring were also treated to a visit to their garage, where they provided dinner and drinks for our entire GPR group. They are really nice people and true car enthusiasts! We lined up our cars, and the newspaper and TV crews interviewed the Tessmans. We were having such a

good time that we lost track of time. We needed to get to Topeka before dark!

The trip down to Heartland Park was a long one. It was long enough to begin with, but it seemed we needed numerous pit stops. Heather was consuming massive quantities of liquids to keep from smoking! Unfortunately, she was constantly looking for a bathroom. This began what seemed like a neverending discussion about bladder control! George Poullos suggested that Heather get some Depends so that we could avoid so many stops. Heather retorted, "Depends don't



There are few destinations whose **I** natural beauty and great mountain roads evoke such anticipation and excitement! Keystone is one of those places. With abundant sunshine and mild temperatures, friendly people and 1,000 Porsches, what more could you ask for in the middle of summer?

With those attributes beckoning, fellow GPR member Kim Burger and I signed up for our first Porsche Parade. Registration began in March, with the first 1,000 registrants accepted. The Parade is the annual Porsche pilgrimage to a U.S. destination, where for a week you can take in everything Porsche and not feel guilty about it. Everyone is there for the same reason - they're crazy about their cars and the Porsche brand. It's a community - a great week of socializing, rallies, autocross,

tech seminars, history and technical challenges (quizzes), a 5K, Concours, RC car racing, dinners, golf, driving tours, and more! The Rocky Mountain and Alpine Regions of the PCA hosted and organized this year's event and did an outstanding job.

Besides Kim and myself, Ezell Fox, Tim Grandon, Paul Gearke, Mitch Schneringer, and Russ Rabler represented the Great Plains Region at the event. There were sightings of a handful of other GPR members in and around Keystone as well.

The week began with a nice solo drive for me from Omaha to Keystone on Sunday. Kim Burger and his wife had left the prior week for a long weekend with some friends of theirs in Denver. Surprisingly, I had to drive 580 of the 600+ mile trip before I saw my first Porsche. After that, the concentration of Porsches in Keystone

was like driving in Stuttgart for the week! Of course, after any 600 mile trip, the first thing you want to do is go wash your ride, which we did at one of several free car washing stations they had set up around Keystone. We met some club members from Oregon and Ohio the first night, as well as a rep from Porsche NA whose job was to wash the cars on display at the conference center. He brought over a Cayman S and a Cayenne GTS while we were there.

Monday dawned with the anticipation of a 4-hour driving tour upon us. 150 had signed up for this first driving tour, so we left the staging area 50 cars at a time, bound for Minturn and Leadville and all the mountain highways in between. What a beautiful drive. We drew a lot of stares from oncoming motorists and townspeople as we snaked our caravan through their sleepy towns on a Monday afternoon. We stopped for a few photo ops of the cars and the scenery (oh yeah, the mountains!), and a little bit of history of the 10th Mountain Division training facility for the U.S. Military. Returning late in the afternoon, we headed over to a welcome reception hosted by our Zone 10 representative and the Kansas City region, where talk of Porsches and car modifications consumed the waning hours before dinner.

Tuesday was Concours and it seemed everyone who had registered









for the Parade was in attendance. Held at the beautiful Keystone Ranch golf course, it was a spectacular sight to behold. There were cars there from every vintage - from Porsche's first tractors to 356s to Carrera GTs. There were even two 959 examples on display. There was something for everyone there and the judging was keen. GPR Members Ezell Fox and Tim Grandon from Grand Island competed in the preservation class with their pristine black '89 911 (pictured above). Having had our fill of eye candy and socializing with members from across the U.S. and Canada, we headed back to the village. Enjoying the previous day's driving tour so much, we headed out for another drive up to Fairplay and Breckenridge via Swan Lake Road. Several other attendees had a similar idea, as we exchanged waves and headlight flashes with many of our Porsche brethren on the way up and back. Dinner at the Swiss Haven restaurant in Breckenridge was a great culinary conclusion to a perfect day.

Wednesday brought a second

place finish for our threesome in the golf tournament at Keystone Ranch. The winnings were not enough to buy any new gear for our cars, but rather some new golf shirts from the pro shop. The TSD rally was taking place concurrent the golf tournament, and being newbies to the Parade, we thought we would try our TSD skills some other time at a smaller scale rally. Technical seminars were available on a variety of topics including tires, Mobil 1, preservation techniques for early 911s, technology in new Porsches, and strategies in high performance driving, to name a few. The highlight of the evening was the unveiling of the new Panamera sedan to a standing ovation at the Concours banquet Wednesday night.

Having to leave for home on Thursday, we missed the Autocross, Gimmick Rally, Beerfest, more driving tours, and the concluding banquet Saturday night, but we immersed ourselves in what we could with the time we had. It left us wanting more and already has us considering a drive to St. Charles, Illinois for next year's Parade. Hope to see you there!







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Member Spotlight



Hello, my name is JR Sanders. Not wanting to put together a boring spotlight article, I asked Sally Knapp if she had any suggestions to get me started. She gave me a list of questions to answer, and these are my favorites.

Five cars I'd like to put in my garage:

- > Any Porsche Cup Car. What could possibly be a better track/race car than a Porsche factory car?
- > Porsche 904. As pretty as any Ferrari and more rare than most. I'm not sure who would keep the four cam engine going though.
- > 427 Cobra reproduction. Of course, an original would be awesome, but I'd want to drive the thing, not just take the cover off and drool on it.
- > Super Duty crew cab pickup. If you're gonna have toys, you've gotta be able to drag them around.
- > 1947 Chrysler Town & Country Sedan. This thing is so big it will take up two stalls. My dad actually had one when I was a little kid and this has always been one of my favorite old cars. The hood is long enough to land a small plane on and the factory spotlights mounted on the front doors can keep a kid entertained all night long. This particular car ended up being sold to a relative in New Mexico who stills drives it (usually in a parade somewhere) and absolutely refuses to sell it back. I would love to participate in the Great American Race with this car and with my Dad as co-pilot. I'd be doing all the driving though.

Five favorite tracks raced on:

- > Stapleton. Yes, the old Denver airport. The Rocky Mountain Region ran a Club Race there once or twice and I was lucky enough to be invited to share Randy Roatch's GT3 car with him. There was so much concrete and it was so flat that the course looked like the world's largest autocross course. Orange pylons were everywhere. We even left a few standing. The layout wasn't that exciting but the speed was awesome. It's a favorite because it was one unique experience that I will most likely never have again.
- > Road America. Because it's huge, fast, very historic, and in a gorgeous wooded area. This is the one track that all road racers and fans must see. My most memorable experience there was racing Jeff Conkel's GT3 class 911. We discovered that if you got the perfect launch onto the super long pit straight and you got the lexan windshield to buffet in and out then you just hit 172 (according to the gear chart). This made finding the brake markers very interesting. They looked like they were moving back and forth about 3 to 5 feet.
- > Brainerd. Similar in experience to Road America. Brainerd is also big, fast and it's located in the northern Minnesota woods. This track has been around about 40 years but it still lacks the history of RA. The thing that sets this place apart from the rest is the awesome hospitality of everyone in the area, especially the folks from the Nord Stern region.
- > Mid-Ohio. Home of the SCCA Run Offs for lots of years. One of the hardest tracks I've had to learn. We just aren't accustomed to having hills peak right in the middle of faster corners when the car is already unloaded. It's not uncommon for one bump in turn 8 to cause the rear wheels of the stiffer cars to leave the pavement. Of course, this happens under heavy acceleration, which is just about the worst time to have the rear end kick out, which causes some very spectacular spins. I wouldn't know anything about this though, only been told. If you do go to Mid-Ohio, be sure to find a local and follow them for a few run groups.
- > Heartland Park. The place where both GPR and myself got started with our track events. This place has been a blast since it opened and gave our club the opportunity to put on the first PCA Club Race in the midwest. Through the years, it has gone through several changes, both major and minor, and now looks like a truly world class racing facility.
