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
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AIR-COOLED MULTI-CYLINDER INTERNAL COMBUSTION ENGINE

Board of Directors Meeting

Minutes of the GPR Board meeting

November 8th, 2022

The Great Plains Region PCA Board met at 6:00 pm via teleconference. Present were David Patterson, Eric Elliott, Carol Lynch, Terry Lessmann, Melinda Halvorson, Mike Anderson, Jeremey Kroh, Bob Kirchner, Rick Mourey and Kurt Halvorson.

PRESIDENT: Patterson opened the meeting and moderated the reports by directors.

SECRETARY: The October 2022 minutes were approved as distributed. Voting for the 2023 GPR board concluded October 31st. 67 member votes were cast. The ballot nominees were elected without exception: President – Mike Anderson, Past President – David Patterson, Secretary – Kurt Halvorson, Treasurer – Robert (Bob) Kirchner, Social Chair – Paul Schudel, Membership Chair – Carol Lynch, Registrar – Terry Lessmann, Safety Chair – Rick Mourey, Editor – Jeremey Kroh, Webmaster – Eric Elliott.

TREASURER: The club's cash balance on October 31, 2022, was \$74,445. Revenue year to date is \$19,766; expenses year to date are \$31,423, for a net year to date loss of \$11,657. The Octoberfast DE made \$442.

SOCIAL: November and December donations for the Ronald McDonald House are to be monetary contributions to adopt families who are staying at the facility over the holidays. Porsches and Pizza social dinner was October 22nd at La Casa West with 44 out of 52 RSVPs attending - no shows were asked to reimburse the club for their meals. Eighteen attended the New Member Dinner November 5th. Porsche Collector Quest Sunday, November 6th drew 22 in attendance. The Ladies Only "Sip and Script" calligraphy event is December 10th – RSVPs are open. PCA subsidies were discussed, which are available for certain social events. Social, Treasurer and President will coordinate a process to apply for these as applicable for 2023.

MEMBERSHIP: We have 219 paid GPR members at present (another new record), out of 304 PCA Primary members assigned to our region. Lifetime member shirts for 2023 have been ordered for the two members who qualify next year. Annual dues expire as of 12/31/22. A reminder for 2023 dues payments will be included in the December newsletter. Lynch plans to provide additional

promotion of the GPR web store to members in the upcoming year.

REGISTRAR: An advanced DE 202 presentation is being readied for Winter 2023. Details to come.

SAFETY: No new National updates this month. Mourey reported he is completing the 2023 Club Race application from PCA while awaiting MPH's response to our proposal regarding event costs. Discussions are underway with PCA regarding their second ambulance requirement for the Club Race and related costs.

EDITOR: November Der Skooner was published and distributed to advertisers and members. A Rocky Mountain Region article, recaps on November social events, Collector Quest, Meet A Member, and an out of region article detailing a trip to the Porsche Museum in Zuffenhausen will be included in the December issue. Kroh will contact advertisers for 2023.

WEBMASTER: GPR website is up to date with confirmed events. November Der Skooner was emailed out November 1st to members. RSVPs are open for the Ladies Only event. The Ronald McDonald House donation page/links and blog post are in place. Elliott will update the web pages for the 2023 Board Members and will update the membership form for 2023. "No show" language will be added to RSVP forms, noting the reimbursement requirement if you register and don't show up for a club paid event.



The next board meeting will be January 10th at 6:00pm.





Zuffenhausen or Bust!

The idea started innocently enough. In the early spring of 2022, it occurred to me that few people travel to Germany in late October. By then, Oktoberfest is over, it is too early to ski, and the Christmas markets have not gone into full swing. 2022 was going to be the year that I go to the Porsche Museum.

It is important to note that I had both selfish and unselfish reasons for visiting the museum. The selfish reason, obviously, was to see the museum and the awe-inspiring pieces within its walls. The unselfish reason was to create a photo catalogue for the folks who may never make it there. As far as I have found, there is no comprehensive, detailed Porsche Museum gallery on the internet. Granted, the exhibits change often. What follows is a short story about the logistics and experience of my trip. As well, there is a link to an organized, detailed Google Photo Album of over 500 pictures from the Porsche Museum at the end of October 2022.

My wife was on board with a solo trip so long as I kept the cost down. I am a no-frills kind of guy (sensible German in my own right). Having travelled extensively on budgets, I know how to keep a trip cheap. This would be an in and out, threedays on the ground, trip. I did not have to look far for great airfare. The lowest cost route was on Lufthansa from Newark, NJ to Frankfurt. This would also require taking roundtrip Amtrak trains from BWI to Newark on the US side. Once in Germany, I would be roundtripping the train between Frankfurt and Stuttgart/Zuffenhausen. The total cost of the trains on both sides plus airfare was way cheaper than flying direct into Stuttgart from any airport close to my home in Maryland.

I know some reading this may think what a hassle - Amtrak to Lufthansa to Deutsche Bahn to S Bahn to shoe leather express. Remember the goal was to keep the cost down. We have one in college and two more coming into college age in the not-too-distant future.

The bottom line is I could have travelled to Zuffenhausen with less hassle but at double the

cost. Long-story short, I'm an experienced traveler accustomed to navigating other countries. I've been to more than 35 countries and have even spent a year circumnavigating the earth. So, taking a bit longer route is not an obstacle. If I am being honest, I enjoyed my travel path to Zuffenhausen and met a few nice people along the way.



For accommodation, I picked Hotel B&B. This is a relatively small hotel chain operating around Europe. Rates are more than reasonable. The rooms are clean, comfy and perfect for folks doing little more than sleeping and showering. More than anything, the Hotel B&B in Zuffenhausen is 300 meters from the museum. What more could I ask for? Before spring had sprung in 2022, I was booked for a fall trip to Zuffenhausen and counting the days.

About three months out, I got an email from Porsche saying that factory tours were back on. As you might have guessed, Covid shut down factory tours for a long time. So, yes, I scheduled a 911 factory tour for the unfathomably low rate of $10\in$. If my excitement was not already primed it went into overdrive with the idea of touring the factory. Oh, by the way entry to the museum for PCA members is only 5 \in .

At 7:30am on Wednesday, October 27th my flight made a blind landing in Frankfurt due to fog. With a short wait for my ICE train to Stuttgart, I enjoyed a few baked goods and a sandwich. Deutsche Bahn has a convenient long -distance station right next to Frankfurt airport that offers a seamless way to get moving once on the ground. The one hour and ten-minute ride deposited me at Stuttgart Hauptbahnhof where I switched to the local S Bahn. Four stops later and I was at the Zuffenhausen Neuwirtshaus stop at Porscheplatz. After a much-needed tenminute walk, I checked in early to the hotel.

With this being a short trip, I knew it was critical to stay awake day one. For that reason, I booked the 911 factory tour in the middle of the day. Interesting content and a lot of walking would keep the sluggishness away. The tour started at the museum where we then walked across the traffic circle with the flying 911s. No cameras or cell phones were allowed on the tour. So, sorry no pics from the tour.

Our first stop on the tour was the point where the painted bodies have been married to the chassis and arrive for the beginning of interior installs. We followed the cars along the way to wheel mounting. On the line, folks have minutes to get their parts of the car in place as the line moves. Funny point our guide made is that the wheel center caps are sent separate from the car due to theft in transport. From there, we visited the leather dying, prep and cutting area. We finished with the boxer engine assembly line. The engine assembly line is long and has many stations that are primarily staffed with humans. It's the rare station that has a robot arm swinging around.

provided impressive insight into the logistics, precision, and production of the iconic 911.

The tour wrapped up in the 3:00 hour and I was starting to feel my energy fade. While tempted to go back to the hotel and sleep until the next day, I opted to take the train into Stuttgart. Right before my arrival, the Porsche Brand Store opened in Stuttgart. Not a store per se, rather a boutique to entertain and amaze. The 'store' does sell some items but seems to be more of a location for cobranding. In the time I was there, a popular DJ was spinning one night and another night there was a wine tasting.

The unseasonably warm weather made for a evening. summer-like Throngs of people shopped and wandered near the area around Schlossplatz. As the sun dipped below the buildings the glow of the Ferris wheel just outside the Neues Schloss grew brighter. At the same time, my energy faded with the sun. On the way back to the S Bahn, I lucked into passing a shawarma joint off Konigstrasse. I can't resist shaved meat stuffed in a pita with the works. With a full belly and short train ride back to the hotel, I turned in for the evening.



The Porsche Museum opened at 9:00am on Friday the 28th. I was up at 7:00am strategizing. Fully stoked for a day in the museum, I fueled up a block down from the hotel at Siegel's 711 bakery. The super friendly staff and wide array of baked goods, coffee and sandwiches made Siegel's a no brainer.

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The one and a half hours spent in the factory

The museum's layout takes you in a long, upward, counterclockwise pattern. Once at the top, you take a long escalator back down. To that end, my strategy was to be there early and go straight to the top and work my way down as others came up. Then, later in the day, when others were at the top, I would start at the bottom. My hope was few people in my photos.

Generally speaking, the strategy worked well as I had the top 1/3 of the museum mostly to myself for 45 minutes. The same was true later in the day. As the final stragglers came into the museum late in the day, they hurried through. This left the first 1/3 of the museum almost empty for the last 45 minutes of the day.

Over the course of two days, I spent 7 hours in the museum capturing all but four cars in fair detail. The four cars I did not capture are in the photos but were on a high shelf that did not allow for detailed photography. Once I photographed all the cars and their respective information placards, I tucked my phone away and wandered through the museum a second time to read, experience and enjoy.



I've been to countless museums around the world. In my opinion, there is no better run or organized than the Porsche Museum. The accessibility of the cars is the key. You can get right up to the cars and take as detailed a photo as you want (as you will see in my pictures).

I cannot express enough what a great experience the museum was. As you walk past some of the 917s you can smell the car. If you are a petrolhead you know the smells I'm talking about. You will visit few museums that give you a visceral response like the Zuffenhausen Porsche Museum will.

A Future We Can Be Proud Of

At heart, I'm an optimist. I'm optimistic about the year ahead. And the years to follow, too.

But it won't be simple. It never is. A number of years ago I worked for a tech firm, whose share price, in the late '90s, was treading water on a par with Apple. Then Steve Jobs introduced the smartphone, and Apple's stock zoomed into another galaxy. And my company? We continued to tread water. Just like the pile of stock and stock options I had. If I had been hitched to Apple, today I'd be calling my pilot to warm up my jet, so we could head to Rio for the Grand Prix.

Then there's the analogy of the 1939 New York World's Fair. I remember seeing newsreels of the event, showcasing the wondrous future we were all destined to enjoy.

Well, they got a few things wrong. Like a certain altercation that started in September of that year. Another was this diorama of a city of the future. They had a lot right. Super-highways zipping around glass-sheathed high-rise towers. Stuff like that.

But the planes. The planes. No, they weren't biplanes. But they were, indeed, all propellerdriven. Deriving power from radial internal combustion engines. Any jet engines in the visage? No. Jet engines, while they may have been under development, had several more years to go before they were introduced to a working airframe. Obviously, the diorama designers did not know jet engines existed, much less how they would revolutionize air travel.

Jump up to the 1964 New York World's Fair. That one I remember. One fun exhibit featured a "picture phone," I believe at the AT&T or Bell Labs pavilion. What a marvel it was ... it only took another 40 years for the product to reach the market.

The point is, it's patently impossible to predict the future with much of a degree of accuracy. We just don't know what technology will take hold,

and what won't, and when that hold will happen.

We see that today. Electric (EV) cars have been around for 120 years. My understanding is that, in the early 1900s, the automobile market was evenly divided three ways – steam, EV and internal combustion. ICE won, mainly because the price of powering movement, gasoline, had reached an affordable level. And the convenience of "filling up" far outweighed the time to charge the battery or literally build up a head of steam. And, of course, the advent of the assembly line, thanks to Henry Ford, didn't hurt.

Isn't it ironic that battery technology continues to be a challenge for EVs, after all these years? Range between charges, the time to charge, the weight of the battery pack. Will EVs really take off? The government thinks so. And manufacturers, around the world, seem to think so too. Although they're all hedging their bets, at least to a certain extent, by continuing to produce ICE vehicles.

What about hydrogen? With hydrogen power, water comes out the tailpipe. Yes, water. Are we at the 1964 World's Fair for hydrogen power? I don't have a clue.

What I do know is that, deep inside a lab somewhere, somebody is probably experimenting with technology that, through unprecedented efficiency, or weight, or emissions decrease, or all of the above, will turn the power source debate on its ear. But when? Ahh, there's the rub.

Then you have autonomous cars. Cars that drive themselves. I thought they'd be here by now. But little did I know about the complexity of writing an algorithm for the vehicle that accounts for the moral dilemma between swerving into a light pole to avoid a dog running into the road ... or swerving into oncoming traffic.

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It's too bad. I've been looking forward to their advent. Not because I actually want one, but because they'll free us enthusiasts to take the long way home. Think of it. While everyone tootles down the freeway in lockstep, you'll have the back roads largely to yourself.

And parking. After a fun day shuttling people around, the autonomous vehicles will all head back to the shed, for maintenance and to be charged up, for another fun day of shuttling people around ... leaving parking spots! On the street!

Oh, I'm looking forward to the New Year. And the years beyond. And I'm ready for it. My manual everything but the windows and sunroof 911 is gassed and ready. For whichever way the road turns.
