Board of Directors Meeting

Minutes of the GPR Board meeting

January 9th, 2023

The Great Plains Region PCA Board met at 6:00 pm at the office of Paul Schudel. Present were Mike Anderson, Eric Elliott (via video conference), Carol Lynch, Terry Lessmann (via video conference), Paul Schudel, Jeremey Kroh, Bob Kirchner, Rick Mourey and Kurt Halvorson (via audio conference). David Patterson was unable to attend.

PRESIDENT: Mike Anderson opened the meeting. Anderson met with Porsche Omaha, and they agreed to provide \$5,000 in sponsorship to the club again this year. Anderson expressed our appreciation to Porsche for their continued support of the club and our members. An Event/Planning calendar was drafted by Anderson and Social Chair Schudel for 2023 from which we can work for planning and adding events throughout the year. Least Of My Brethren was selected as our charity for the year. They assist homeless with donated items and strive to move them off the street. Monthly needs will be communicated to our membership.

SECRETARY: The November 2022 minutes were approved as distributed.

TREASURER: The club's cash balance on December 31, 2022, was \$76,180. Revenue for the year was \$22,155; expenses were \$35,137, for a fiscal year 2022 loss of (\$12,982).

SOCIAL: January events include Porsche Omaha breakfast on the 14th with a DE 202 presentation, and the annual Winter Party on the 21st. February 11th is Porsches at Paradise. A women's event is being planned for late February. March 11th is Porsches at Paradise, and Supercar Saturday for those wishing to attend following breakfast (not a GPR event). A possible UP Museum event is being considered for the end of March. April 8th is Porsche Omaha breakfast with a DE 101 presentation to follow. A Fun Run for April 15th is being planned as well. Discussion ensued around a possible overnight trip to Valentine and the Sand Hills area for the summer.

MEMBERSHIP: We had 219 paid GPR members at 12/31/22 out of 307 PCA Primary members assigned to our region. As of 1/8/23 GPR paid members for 2023 total 153. There are 82 outstanding renewals. Winter Party attendees will be required to have paid their dues in order to attend the dinner party. A Lifetime member was gracious enough to continue to pay their dues for 2023.

REGISTRAR: The DE 202 presentation will take place at

the January breakfast at Porsche Omaha on January 14th. 2023 DE dates will be added to ClubRegistration.Net as contracts are finalized.

SAFETY: Chair Mourey participated in the national quarterly DE committee meeting. 2023 DE Minimum Standards were reviewed; GPR continues to meet or exceed the Standards. EVs not be allowed at DEs in 2023; safety management, fire extinguishing among the reasons. RPM DE dates: 4/29, 8/26, 10/7. MPH Club Race dates are set: 5/19 -5/21 including DE run groups all three days. A DE 101 is planned for the Porsche Omaha breakfast in April. MPH Club Race contract finalized; awaiting national steward assignment, volunteer positions confirmed, looking for additional volunteers to backfill. Working on additional marketing to Club Racers and DE participants for the Club Race weekend. Instructor availability to be confirmed by Mourey with existing approved instructors, with a new Instructor Class planned with PCA for 2023 as well (to add additional instructors to the GPR ranks).

EDITOR: January Der Skooner was published and distributed to advertisers and members. February Der Skooner will feature a Meet A Member, a "new" car build and track history installment from a member, and a Rocky Mountain Region contribution. Editor Kroh is researching ideas for prizes for the points winner(s) who participate(s) in the most events this year.

WEBMASTER: GPR website is up to date with all membership forms, board page updated, email addresses updated, DE web page and forms updated, new 2023 DE Safety Guidelines form uploaded to site, events updated, club advertisers page updated for 2023, RPM DE dates added to calendar. Der Skooner was emailed out 1/2/23. Email reminders sent out for Winter Party.

OTHER BUSINESS: Discussion ensued around making GPR medallions available to members for a fee or donation to the club. The use of PCA Glovebox for board document retention was discussed as well, with follow up scheduled at February's meeting.

The next board meeting will be Monday February 13th at 6:00pm at 10250 Regency Circle, Suite 525.





A Porsche Love Affair

My love affair with Porsche (and 911 in particular) started early, sometime during my teenage years. I remember having a poster of a black 930 Turbo on my bedroom wall, adjacent to a poster of a Lamborghini Countach. That love, however, eventually went dormant as I progressed through high school and college with insufficient income to even consider a Porsche. Then came marriage and children – and more years passed. By 2009, though, my friend John Krecek invited Kelly and I out to a GPR DE for parade laps. I was hooked!

The afternoon passed as quickly as the Porsches lapped the track. Then, as the sun began to fall lower in the sky over Glenwood, I turned to Kelly and proposed the idea that we needed a 911. After all, with two young boys who would fit perfectly in the back, it was the "practical" thing to do! Unable to argue my logic, Kelly consented, and we soon acquired a black 1987 Targa. I was in love! With 218 horsepower on tap and some great suspension upgrades, that little car could keep pace with almost anything out there at the time. Notably, it was still 2009 and there weren't any Mustangs cantering around with 760 horsepower and an independent suspension capable of high-speed cornering.



By the time 2011 rolled around, we were fortunate enough to purchase one of the only 600 GT3 RS 4.0s made during the 997 years. With 500 naturally-aspirated horses. That car was next-level on the track! My brother Doug and I

could mow down just about anything on the track in that car. Regrettably, due to a lack of foresight, we made a poor decision and sold the car for exactly what we paid for it – roughly a year before values tripled! Follow me for more great investment advice...



Continuing my string of poor decisions, I then traded away our black Targa for a 987 Cayman (another decision I'd come to regret, although I did love the Cayman). Nevertheless, our time with the GT3 RS 4.0 was special, and I fell in love with the 997s. To my eye, they're the prettiest of the water-cooled cars. As our family grew, we eventually worked our way through a few Cayennes and a Macan until recently, with both of our boys grown and the nest almost empty, I allowed my mind to drift to what I might drive daily now that I no longer have a need for a full-size back seat.

A good friend of mine who's built several Porsche engines for me in the past, shared online that he was now building 4.1-liter monster motors for 997.1 911s. I commented that it would be amazing to drive one as a daily, but it would need to be a C4 or C4S to be able to drive year-round in the Nebraska snow. And so, two winters ago, that friend texted me pictures of a Guards Red 2007 Targa 4S with 118,000 miles. He'd acquired it very cheaply because the engine needed to be rebuilt as a result of bore scoring. I showed the photos to my wife (who now claims to not remember the conversation) and told her I thought this might be the car for me.

It took two years to complete the 4.1-liter build due to the meticulous and time-consuming work involved. The car was finally delivered just a few days before this past Christmas. I put a set of snow tires on a set of rims I'd acquired from Joe Chambers — and it is indeed a blast to drive! There will be no "garage queen" status for this car. It's going to be driven!



Backing up just a bit: When we say of PCA that it's not just the cars, it's the people, it really is. I'd always regretted my decision to trade my first 911 away, and I'd longed to find it again. Even so, 10 years passed without even a glimpse of it locally. Then in the summer of 2021, our GPR's Jim Avilla sent me a Facebook link to a car that looked remarkably like my old '87 Targa. Jim wanted to buy it, but was kind enough to offer me right of first refusal if it was indeed my old car.

I went to North Omaha to look at the car, and low and behold, it was the very same Targa I'd trad-

ed in more than a decade before. What's more, it only showed an additional 2,000 miles on the odometer! We made a deal (and a good one at that) and I drove my Targa back home where she belongs. This past summer I took her back out for a DE – and all the feels, smells, and sounds from 2009 came right back to me. I love the way that old car moves around the track!

I guess my point is this. I don't know how many more Porsches we'll own in the future. All I do know is that I'm glad have the '87 Targa back. I don't plan on making the same mistake twice, so it's probably here to stay. And the '07 Targa, although its only been in our garage a few weeks now, seems to be off to a great start. I look forward to seeing what our future holds, but one thing's for sure – there is no substitute!



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


A Note from the Editor

Vent foam. That seems to be a popular topic on various social media forums from newbie 986/996/987/997 owners. What is this black foam that blows in my face when I kick the HVAC system on? Long story short, it covers the blend doors in the heater core assembly. It degrades over time and ends up on your jacket or your dates' dress and causes a little bit of panic until you figure out that it isn't crawling around.

A few YouTube videos later and it was time to tackle that issue myself. You basically have three options. 1) Replace the entire assembly (requires removing the dash). 2) Remove the HVAC controls or radio from the dash and cut the ductwork to recover the blend door. Or 3) Remove the heater core with some much less invasive surgery to remove the blend door and recover. I choose option 3. I'll share a few photos, but if you ever want to hear more about it, ask me about it at our next event.

"All the best." We use the expression all the time, don't we. It's especially handy as a sign-off in correspondence. Where we sometimes condense it into simply "Best." Which is nice and neat. But it begs a simple question. What do we mean? Have the best day ever? Be the best that we can be? Just what are we doing?

I started to think about this while procrastinating on-line, which is a favorite time-killer of mine. I was skimming YouTube videos and ran into a clip of Secretariat winning the Belmont Stakes in 1973, to win the Triple Crown by obliterating the field.

The call by Chick Anderson is worth the time, in and of itself. "Secretariat is widening now. He's moving like a tremendous machine!" The horse goes on to win by 31 lengths ... 31 lengths! At the finish, the second-place horse is hardly in the frame of the camera. "Secretariat is all alone!" This is widely considered the greatest race of all time. And Big Red is generally acknowledged as the greatest horse of all time.

Watch the Belmont video. It's spine-tingling. Like Tiger Woods' putt at The Masters. The one that went curling up, almost perfectly diagonal to the cup, and then began turning, slowly, toward the hole. It went rolling, rolling, rolling, until ... it ... went ... in. And the call, remember? "Better than most, better than most, better than most..."

In my denial of work to do, I ran across another YouTube video. A speech by a retired SR-71 Blackbird pilot. "Know what kind of radar we had? We didn't have any radar. Know what kind of computers we had? We didn't have computers. Know what kind of flaps, spoilers, speed brakes? We didn't have flaps, spoilers, speed brakes. The airplane was your basic '60s street rod, go fast, burn gas airplane, and I loved it," says Air Force Major (ret) Brian Shul.

He goes on, "Only 93 men in history flew this jet ... we're doing a mile every two seconds ... over

4,500 missiles were fired at this jet in 25 years. Not one was ever hit."

Then you have the stories about Stirling Moss and Denis Jenkinson in the 300 SLR, Number 722, winner of the 1955 Mille Miglia. This was before intercoms, remember, and the SLR was a roadster. So conversation was impossible. Jenkinson mapped the entire route, 1,000 miles, on a paper roller. He'd scroll forward as they progressed, and give Moss hand-signals for what was ahead.

The quote I like most from Moss, and I'm paraphrasing, is that the straights are the boring parts between the corners.

My Formula 1 idol, growing up, was Jim Clark. Jackie Stewart was quoted as saying, and again I'm paraphrasing, that a group of drivers in that era were fast. But they all knew that Clark was the fastest.

Clark was asked how he does it, and he shrugged and said he just brakes a little later.

When it comes to Porsches, my favorite stories revolve around the 917/30. The Sunoco 917, run by Penske and driven by Mark Donohue, which so overwhelmed the competition that it killed the Can Am series as it had been. And was the death knell for "run what you brung," never to be seen again, at least in high-level motor sports.

"You can never have too much horsepower," Donohue said about the car. And, with upwards of 1,500 hp in qualifying trim, he wasn't kidding. To prove it, he'd leave the pits with a few quick twitches of the wheel, sending the car into a controlled left, right, left, right slide. Just because.

The stories go on and on. Ruth, Aaron, Jordan, Pele, Messi, Brady, Orr, Gretzky, Woods, Nicklaus, Hogan, Fangio, Schumacher, Rossi. Williams, King, Vonn, Schifrin. No, this is not an allinclusive list. But it is a list of some of the most extraordinary. The very best that ever lived. As chronicled by their achievements.

Yes, that's what "all the best" should mean. And, in that spirit, we should all keep using it.





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
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
