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

Keeping with the theme of zero to 60, some things just go quickly. Having recently been to the Carrera GT race at Motorsports Park Hastings I have to say **tires** go quickly. Back in the day, people talked about tires lasting 5-7 years. This was true when you only drove 10-12,000 miles a year, so you got 60,000 miles out of a set.

When a mechanic said it was time for new brake pads, it was hard for this non-car person to understand how they could have worn out and I needed new ones. And rotors? What the heck are those and how could they possibly need to be replaced?

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# **Board of Directors Meeting**

#### Minutes of the GPR Board meeting

#### May 9th, 2023

The Great Plains Region PCA Board met at 6:00 pm at the home of Mike Anderson. Present were Mike Anderson, Carol Lynch, Paul Schudel, Terry Lessmann, David Patterson and Kurt Halvorson. Eric Elliott, Rick Mourey, and Jeremey Kroh joined via teleconference. Bob Kirchner was unable to attend.

**PRESIDENT:** Anderson reviewed PCA Glovebox for document archiving and announced current needs for Least of My Brethren. There will also be forthcoming via email to the membership. Region subsidy opportunities, possible joint event with the South Dakota region, and a marketing chair position were also discussed.

**PAST PRESIDENT:** No report this month.

**SECRETARY:** The April 2023 minutes were approved as distributed.

**TREASURER:** Bank balances as of April 30 are \$67,533, which do not include the results of the RPM DE event.

SOCIAL: On May 6<sup>th</sup> ten ladies toured Lauritzen Gardens and enjoyed lunch onsite. May 13<sup>th</sup> is the May Flowers Fun Run with donuts and coffee available at the start. The event looks to be full at 36 cars participating. May 20<sup>th</sup> features a dinner and car corral at Lochland Country Club in Hastings as part of the Club Race/ DE weekend (19<sup>th</sup>-21<sup>st</sup>), with only a \$10 member co-pay. June 4<sup>th</sup> is the Annual Picnic (catered by Porky Butts) and Car Show at Walnut Grove Park. June 9<sup>th</sup> features a self-pay dinner at Bravo Cucina with members of the Schonesland (lowa) region, and the 10<sup>th</sup> features a club breakfast with the Schonesland region at Bentley Omaha followed by Supercar Saturday (not a GPR event). July 8<sup>th</sup> is Porsches at Paradise breakfast. An overnight Sandhills drive to Valentine is planned for July 15-16, with registration available online beginning June 1st.

**MEMBERSHIP:** We have 191 paid GPR members out of 309 PCA Primary members assigned to our region. Chair Lynch indicated the personal notes by President Anderson to new members are helpful for engaging the members from the outset of their membership.

**REGISTRAR:** The RPM Spring Fling DE had 25 participants, including 2 novices and 1 driver who graduated. The May Flowers Fun Run looks to be near or at capacity by the sign up deadline (36 cars). Club Race and DE registration for MPH on May 19-21 is open, with 24 club racers registered, along with 27 DE participants (including 2 novices and a third looking to graduate). Over 50 individuals have signed up for the Lochland dinner on Saturday the 20<sup>th</sup> in Hastings.

**SAFETY:** PCA noted a trend where racetracks are not allowing the PCA waiver to be used at the gates of their facilities. Chair Mourey indicated this is not an issue for the two tracks GPR utilizes. Insurance for the May Flowers Fun Run has been secured from PCA. Club Race/DE updates: meetings with the PCA assigned personnel and track personnel have taken place; all equipment is enroute and processes are finalized. Mid-America Championship Series materials (banners and stickers) will be available to racers at MPH. PCA insurance has been secured for the Club Race and DE.

**EDITOR:** May Der Skooner was published and distributed to our advertisers and to the website. June issue will feature recaps on the Spring Fling DE, Ladies Event, and Fun Run. Meet A Member and out of region columnists will also be included. **Member content contributions for Der Skooner are welcomed!** Editor Kroh will provide tables for the picnic to save the club rental costs with an outside vendor.

**WEBMASTER:** GPR website is up to date with all known events. May Der Skooner was emailed out April 30<sup>th</sup>. RSVP forms and links are available for: Mayflowers Fun Run, Club Race Dinner, Annual Picnic, Schonesland joint events. Reminder emails will go out for the picnic and Schonesland events on designated dates prior to the event deadlines.

The next board meeting will be Tuesday, June 13th at 6:00pm at the Anderson's home.

# May Racing Update

The annual Porsche Club of America Club Race took place at Motorsport Park Hastings (MPH) May 20, 21. It was another great event put on by the Great Plains Region with many thanks and congratulations to race co-chairs Rick Mourey and Roger Williams, club President Mike Anderson and the crew of volunteers.

The MPH track is a gem in middle Nebraska and if you haven't made it over, I hope you take the opportunity to attend an event there in the future. The area has a great vibe, and the track and facilities are nicely maintained.

Thursday evening featured a locals 'run what you brung' drag race event on the front straight. Entertaining to see a mix of competitors ranging from newer pickup trucks to a very fast Chevelle take pulls down the track. Appeared to be a fun and casual event with drivers picking their own lineup order and heading to the starting lights.

If you recall from last year the MPH track was resurfaced in 2022 and we had a very fast 2022 club race. I was very curious how the 2023 edition would play out. The track proved to be just as fast as 2022 and yet, in some ways, it was somehow a bit more difficult to drive. My simple analysis would be that the perfect line was still there for a fast lap. But racers and DE drivers who were off by just a fraction on that line were treated to a somewhat unpredictable loss of grip. Luckily, the track has very broad run out sections and lots of space for those who tested the limits of adhesion. Talking to a few drivers, we thought once there were a few spins and off-track excursions as there was a lot of dirt and debris getting carried out into those fast corners. Due to the dry conditions and loose soil, those heading off track sent up spectacular plumes of dirt that slowly drifted off in the wind. This provided more than a few "ooooohhh who was that ?" moments for the spectators and drivers.

PCA features multi class racing and the mix of cars creates a fun challenging event. GTB1 Caymans had the biggest class with six cars, SP1 944's with five cars, SPB Boxsters with three cars. And several classes with two or one competitor.

Race 1 Saturday afternoon was set to perfect weather and the grid had been nicely sorted out in Qualifying. The race started with a scramble at the first turn with a few cars being pushed wide and into the dirt including GTB1 leader Keith Slankard. Luckily, everyone got through cleanly, but this caused a re-shuffling of the field as many cars from mid pack were able to get through the chaos in the front rows. I was shuffled back a half dozen places and found myself with Steve Coomes and Jay Walker in their Spec Caymans. The Spec Caymans are plenty fast in all areas of the track and it took the first third of the race to clear them. They seemed to be having a blast swapping places and challenging almost every corner. Slankard recovered from the first lap shuffle and took the top spot in GTB1 in front of me.

Dale Hartzell took the overall win in the GTA1 Cup.

Terry Morris edged Dale Tuety for first in the SP1 class.

Keith Olcha led out the spec Boxsters pretty much start to finish for the class win

Race 2 got things rolling quickly on Sunday morning. The weather was perfect with calm wind and cool but warming temperatures.

The start was much smoother than the Race 1 and sorted out quickly in the first lap. I was happy to get a good jump on the GTB1 field and led the group for the first eight laps. I started making some mental mistakes with some mis-shifts and that led to an easy overtake by Keith Slankard who again took the checkered flag in GTB1 and I was a bit behind in 2nd. The race for 3rd in GTB1 was intense with Lisa Hunsicker and Mark Hoffman dueling most of the thirty-minute race. Hunsicker gapped Hoffman by a tenth of a second at the finish line for the last spot on the podium.

Dale Tuety jumped into first in SP1 mid race to edge Terry Morris for the win.

Keith Olcha again led the SPB.

There was a great race at the front of the field too with De Andrade taking top spot over Hartzell by a mere three tenths of a second.

Race 3 was a fast turnaround after race 2 and things were a quite interesting by mid race. Take your pick between a back-to-back race format, drivers getting tired, tires giving out, or debris on the track. One or all of those factors led to a competitive and entertaining race.

In GTB1, I managed to survive a race of attrition and come out in first place. Slankard had a shifting issue that saw him dropping back though the field four laps into the race. I was happy to jump

into the lead with Hunsicker never more than a few yards off my rear bumper. We ran this way for another ten laps and on lap twelve Lisa timed a pass perfectly with some lapped traffic and all I could do was laugh at my poor car placement as she sailed through the inside line into Turn three. This corner would come into play two laps later when Lisa over ran turn 3 and enjoyed a slide into the bean field. Happy to retake the lead for the second time, I nursed my well over cooked front tires through the last laps of the race. Talking to a few other racers we were recounting the number of giant dust plumes we saw throughout the race. There were more than a few wheels in the dirt moments in race three.



Beep Beep, Beep Beep, Yeah

Get it? The car show returned to my home stomping grounds, this spring, after a Covidrelated hiatus and an effort to reinvent the concept in an outdoor venue.

An outdoor venue? Yes, a parking lot and, no, it didn't work. Not if you've ever spent time in Denver on a warm sunny day. It's hot, too hot.

So anticipation ran deep as I made my way back to the traditional venue, the Convention Center, for the annual conclave. Once again, for the eighth, ninth, tenth, I can't remember, year, I joined my colleagues from the Rocky Mountain Automotive Press Assn. on Press Day.

Although Press Day was not much more than a morning – the doors swung open, and the public joined us after lunch. No matter, half the fun is talking "gearhead" with fellow scribes, regardless of who else is around.

The take-away? Comments like, gee, are we getting old, or does the hall seem to have shrunk? It was the floor space devoted to the show that had shrunk. And, gosh, a lot of pick-ups and SUVs and EVs this year. There were no Porsches (they've never shown up, in my recollection,) no Mercedes, no BMWs.

But there was a star-burst of excitement ... McLaren. That's right. A local dealer brought four cars, which we could sit in. Which we all did. Then, a salesman, quite knowledgeable, gave a presentation on their line-up.

What they wanted to hype was the Artura. Although they didn't have one there. And the upcoming 750S, which they didn't have, either. Although they did have two 720S models.

The salesman noted that the Artura will lose two cylinders from the traditional McLaren V8. But it gets sufficient charge, from an electric motor, to add up to 671 hp. And it still weighs 3400 lbs, more or less. If this is the future of car enthusiasm, I'm all in. Although I wonder if it is.

Then someone asked what the MSRP is. The salesman replied that the model starts at \$237,500. We collectively sighed -- that's a lot of money. But then someone noted that it's not too far off from a new Porsche Turbo S. And that enlisted a lot of conversation over which one we would choose. Which came down to, introvert or extrovert? How badly do you want to show you've made it? How much attention can you live with?

Someone asked the salesman, who buys them? Doctors, lawyers, Indian chiefs, he said. What sells them? Two words, the salesman said, drive it. That's all it takes. They sell every car they get.

I'm not sure we can say the same thing at the Nissan display, where two very nice reps walked us through ... you know, I don't remember what they walked us through. And I don't think it matters. I wasn't interested. What I do remember is that a few colleagues asked some relatively esoteric questions ... and they said they'll get back to us. They didn't have an answer. It happened several times.

And I realized that these reps were not gearheads, not by a long shot. It was their job. I had a similar revelation years ago, when I was with Kraft in Chicago. We hired a new speechwriter, Alan, who came from General Motors, where he had written for Roger Smith.

Which made me need to get to know Alan. I took him to lunch, and asked him, what's it like working for a car company? Can you, like, call down to the motor pool, and requisition the new Corvette for the weekend?

Alan responded that, yes, you may be able to do that. Although, I must say, it sounded like he wasn't sure. So I asked him, well, uh, are you a car enthusiast? I was being polite. He said, and I quote, "you learn to appreciate the product."

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
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
